



Fishing Report...

The weather has been great for fishing! Offshore gag grouper can be found in 40-65 ft depths using live pinfish or frozen sardines. Take some shrimp and light tackle to catch mangrove snapper and hogfish along with seabass and white grunts. Don't forget to check the stone crab trap buoys for triple tail on the way out, they will eat a live shrimp.

This is a great time of year to catch sheepshead on fiddler crabs, shrimp, or oysters. Check the dock pilings to find them along with some small black drum. Silver trout will be in the channel on the north side of the bridge heading to Honeymoon Island. Just drift the area with small soft jigs to find them. Be safe and go catch some fish!

As was the custom back then we were free range kids amidst the backdrop of lakes, orange groves, farmland, hammocks and swamps. It was a paradise to grow up in and I mourn its loss.

Ironically, I had no experience with the bay coast and the Gulf beyond. My father had serious sun damage to his skin and my mother was terrified of water. Thus, water activities were not on the agenda. I grew up completely unaware of the stories of Captain Kate, Clark Mills, and the pram fleet, among other things. However, I must say that when we drove down Edgewater Drive to shop in Clearwater, or went to the beach with visiting friends and relatives, the waterfront had an unusual appeal to me.

That all changed in my freshman year of high school when our band went to the Bahamas for a weekend spring trip. A nearby storm caused nearly everyone to become miserably seasick on the way over. 

Walt and Marion Weber were Life Members of the DBC for as long as anyone could remember. He and Marion knew more about the origin and history of the club than anyone! As historian, Marion created scrapbooks of pictures from year to year and Walt was always correcting and editing her documentation. Walt and Marion both treated the Clubhouse like it was their own home, daily venturing down to sit on the porch and watch the sunsets. He was an accomplished sailor, boater, his marlinspike seamanship unmatched. Whenever any of us bought new lines, we would take them along with our shackles for Walt to perform his splicing magic.

Truly a "gate keeper" of the clubhouse, he always wanted to make sure that it was closed correctly, and sometimes early, following events. As a team, both Walt and Marion served as Social Chairs for many years, buying only the cheapest beer for parties insuring we stayed on our beer budget for the year. Whenever there was work to be done, Walt always made sure he was there, and the club was open for the workmen. He knew where every rat was in the building. He was one of the first to arrive at the club following the "no name "storm and was always quick to point out the high-water line that he marked on the east interior wall. Most of the furniture at one time in the club was a result of his scouring the shore after heavy storms.

Walt Weber's love of the Dunedin Boat Club was deeply personal. Although he never served as a Commodore, his contributions to what DBC is today he was very influential as the club ebbed and flowed over the years.

Walt, you will be missed! Hope your ghost hangs around a long time!
