

Here is our book selection


Our book selection is "The Pull of the Stars," by Emma Donoghue.

Fishing Report...

The weather is starting to cool and the Spanish mackerel have arrived! Anchor offshore in 18-20 feet of water and have plenty of greenbacks in the livewell to start. Use long shank 3/0 hooks to help prevent breakoffs and let out your line with a live greenback or shrimp to catch them. Bluefish and kings may also join the party. Ice your fish right away and filet taking the blood line out, the taste will surprise you. My son thought the Spanish mackeral was grouper! Offshore in 40 feet+ you will find grouper, grunts, seabass, and snapper. Always free line a pinfish behind the boat while bottom fishing and you may catch a cobia or kingfish. Get out there and fish!

Insights...



September Highlight Dan Johnson Member since 2019 I grew up in suburbs of Philadelphia but spent many a summer day at my grandparents' cottage on the Chesapeake Bay below Annapolis. At the age of 13 I bought my own boat and motor with snow shoveling and grass cutting money. My grandpa facilitated the purchase. It was a world of wooden power boats back then.

My grandpa was a part-time waterman, taking fishing parties out on weekends on his 36 foot Deadrise while working as a Navy Yard foreman in Washington during WWII. By the time I came along, he had retired and sold the Deadrise. Once I bought my boat though, he became my fountain of knowledge for all things nautical, accompanying me on fishing and crabbing expeditions. It was a class room on the water and a summer school I enjoyed.

Skip forward a dozen years found me a college dropout, in the Army and married when he passed away. After my service obligation expired, I sold my boat, pursued a college degree, and started a career, first with Proctor-Silex then 3M. Living in Annapolis, a friend of my wife persuaded me to take her two kids sailing on their Sunfish in the back bay of Spa Creek. Such a simple boat, once I figured it out I was hooked. Later that year I crossed paths with another ex-Philadelphian with who I shared a number of acquaintances. Glenn had recently purchased a Columbia 26 and was looking for crew for weekend sailing. I began my lessons on keel boat sailing, going sailing on nights, weekends, anytime at the drop of a dock line.

Sailing into Baltimore harbor at night was both relaxing and challenging: big ships travel silently at close to 20 knots in the approach channels—lessons in situational awareness and navigational lighting of stationary and moving objects began. Our most memorable experience was to have sailed out of Annapolis to greet some of the tall ships arriving for their Bicentennial visit.

Alas, life intervened with raising a family, employment changes with a move to central Pennsylvania. My great friend and sailing mentor, Glenn Craul, contracted colon cancer which his hard-fought battle did not overcome. My late wife came to my emotional rescue, finding a 15 foot Designer's Choice trailer sailor for sale. With it I traveled to many of the Pennsylvania state park lakes and regularly down to Havre de Grace at the head of the Chesapeake Bay on weekends.

An opportunity to manage a boat dealership that sold Chaparrals, Pro-Lines, and Hunter trailer sailboats opened a door to return to the water and sailing. When the business closed, I began maintaining a customer's Seward and going sailing with him or my wife on weekends. I joined the North East Yacht Club and started sailing as crew on other peoples' boats. The urge to own my own boat began to grow.

A year later I came across a deal I couldn't pass up. A Coronado 27 (a Columbia 26 with a full flat top cabin) came on the market. The owner acquired a bigger boat and could no longer continue the refurbishment of the 27. The original owner commissioned it in Sausalito California and brought it to the Chesapeake on its own bottom, through the Panama Canal and up the inland waterway. With such a pedigree and hours of knowledge gained from my friend Glenn's boat, I grabbed it without hesitation..

Over the next two years the Coronado was stripped out inside, cleaned, scrubbed, painted, and rebuilt. I honed my skills at fiberglassing, refinishing teak, creating an electric system, rigging restoration, and boat maintenance. My Seward friend and I launched it on the hottest day that July, motored it around the Susquehanna Flats with the mast on deck, docked in an unfamiliar marina after dark, and collapsed below into a sound sleep only the motion of a boat in the water can give.

Through the next five years the Coronado proved to be a great boat to begin with, serving my wife and I well as weekend dwellers and short distance venturers. We began considering the advantages of a bigger boat (don't we all contemplate this!)—30 to 32 feet started to sound right. It was not to be. Instead, I was offered the acquisition of a Hunter 34 by my former club commodore. The 27 went onto the hard, up for sale, and we enjoyed the last month of summer sailing with our new acquisition. For the next dozen years we sailed the Hunter all over the northern Chesapeake Bay. Weekend marina hopping, summer week vacation cruises, or just enjoying our "condo on the water" in-slip at the club—a great way of life! I never raced the Hunter. Instead, from the day I joined NERYC, I began crewing in club races. Starting on a 27 as a jib sheet trimmer, I became proficient at sailboat racing: mainsheet trimmer, foredeck crew, spinnaker pit man, relief helmsman. It was on the helm I came into my own. Crewing for dockmates, I gained a reputation for line honors at race starts, course holding and tactical positioning, and boat handling. With one captain, we didn't finish lower than third-in-fleet for several seasons, taking home the first place silver each time.

My late wife's health began to deteriorate and I needed to devote all my time to her. The Hunter was sold and we moved here to Florida to escape the cold for a better life. For my wife it was to no avail as she ultimately suffered a massive stroke and passed on. That was the impetus to return to the sailing world. I began evaluating the club situation on here on the Gulf coast. Having been the NERYC club manager for my last two years there, I didn't want the white tablecloth and coat/tie dinner dress code environment again. That's how I happened across the Dunedin Boat Club web site and decided to explore what appeared to be an active club with a casual, laid-back approach. Boy was I right!

Now a member since the fall of 2019, I serve on the club's race committee and am the club liaison to our sponsored Sea Scout Ship 956. I've met some great folks and enjoyed the club's activities. Remarried (to a Canadian former sailor no less) and settled into our new home together, I'm enjoying life and looking forward to participating in more activities on the water. Dunedin Boat Club is a great place to do just that!






