Bring: Snacks, drinks, cover up, sunscreen, and bug repellant.





The Book Club's next meeting is Wed., July 13th, at 7pm. Sign up on the Event section of the Boat Club website.


The book selection is "**The Winemaker's Wife: A Novel**," *by Kristen Harmel*.

Fishing Report...

Blue crabs are available now and the easiest way to catch them is at night during low tide on the grass flats. All you need is a bright headlamp (I like Princeton Tec), a crab net, and a five gallon bucket. Walk the shallow flats in waist to ankle deep water and scoop them up with your net. Backfin crab meat is \$31 a pound and a few hours at night produces at least a dozen crabs.

Scallop season in Pasco County begins on Friday July and ends on Sunday July 24th. To catch them you will need snorkel gear and a mesh bag to collect them in. The limit is 2 gallons per person or 10 gallons per boat in the shell. It is a 20-30 minute boat ride from Homeport Marina where we keep our boat to the scallop areas north of the Anclote River. The water is very clear which is what the scallops like and the underwater views are great. I have spotted several sea turtles and lots of fish while scalloping and the waters depth ranges from 3 to 6 feet. Make sure you fly a legal dive flag (20 x 24 inches) from the highest point of your boat. Should be a great season barring any red tide this year. Insights...



June Highlight
Carol Elwood
Life Member
1990

I was born in Cleveland and lived in the Pittsburg and Chicago areas before moving to Florida with my three sons in 1979. Critical care nursing was my profession for nearly 50 years. I now volunteer for Hospice, giving respite care.

A year and a half after putting my feet in the sand, I met Howard, my husband of 40 years who gave me the biggest gift I have ever received by introducing me to sailing. "With the sun on my face and wind in my hair, I glide through the water, powered by nothing but air!" I had been athletic my entire life, and always attracted to water. During middle school, I was on the swim team and did synchronized swimming, picturing my eleven-year-old self with the grace of Esther Williams. Sailing had always held an interest for me and living near Lake Michigan one would think I would have experimented with it there. I simply did not know how to go about it and having 3 boys in 5 years changed my priorities.



When I first started working at Morton Plant in February, one of my coworkers in ICU had a catamaran. I was trying to figure out how to ask for a sail. A few weekends later his catamaran capsized in the Gulf in one of our 42-degree cold fronts. It took a while to rescue him, and he ended up in his own ICU with severe hypothermia. So, scratch that idea.

Then I met Howard who had friends with sailboats. One of them owned a 16' Com-Pac and we went out sailing in it. He was telling us about the Com-Pac Yacht Association which met at the Dunedin clubhouse and had races, day sails, island picnics and anything to do with water. Every member had a Com-Pac of some size: 16, 19, or 23'. There were other young families with kids. They had educational speakers every month. Within 6 months we had a 16' Com-Pac in our garage and joined the club.

The boat was perfect as it was so solid that the kids could take the helm with no worry of capsizing. If we didn't use it for 2 months due to Scouts and soccer activities, it was tucked into the garage with no added expense. Many weekends our sons would race against us in another member's boat. As they got older, we would set them on Com-Pac Island with a cooler and let them explore while we raced, picking them up afterwards to join us for the potluck dinner to come. I have always loved spending the night on the boat.





When we moved up to a 23' Com-Pac, we began to do more of that and cruising the coastline. As the boys turned into teens, they were reluctant to give up their weekend time with their friends to go sailing with us. We solved that by inviting as many friends as we could squeeze into the boat. Picking up a pizza around 10pm, we'd go down to the boat, go out in the bay and anchor off for the night. Board games were pulled out and we would play games until 1 or 2am. As everyone knows, teens sleep late. This gave Howard and I time to quietly pull up anchor and get a full morning of sailing in before they even stirred.

During the time with the Com-Pac, I bought a Sunfish and sailed with Windlasses for what amounted to 25 years. We bought a 27' Starwind which we raced and cruised up and down the west coast, followed by our present boat Island Hopper, a Hooks Custom 34'. There is not one aspect of sailing that I do not enjoy.

Through the years sailing has been the balance I needed to counter my nursing careers stress. Anchoring out and watching the world go by, cruising with buddy boats, day sailing or racing all restore my soul. There is nothing like the teamwork during a race to get your adrenaline running and your friendships growing. I even enjoy the messy projects and boat maintenance. I have worked on the boat side by side with Howard so that we both know its quirks, how to change alternators, starters, impellers etc.

So, to anyone who is thinking of taking the step into sailing, what are you waiting for? When life's got you down and things seem kind of grey... get in a boat and sail away!!!
