

Over 35 Boat Club members in beautiful costumes walked with or rode on the float during the parade.

With less than 30 minutes to "roll time" for the parade we discovered that the west wall lights and the lights on both sides of the curvy top of the wall would not light even though we had tested the entire float two days earlier. diagnosed the issue (a blown plug on the wall string) and using a new set of lights and staple gun from our "go kit" restrung the entire west side of the wall, plugged in the top-of-wall string and voila!...we were good to go with minutes to spare. We are very fortunately to have such capable and dedicated volunteers!

Fishing Report...

The fishing has been great these last two weeks, catching many fish inshore on soft jigs. Many trout were caught with some Spanish mackerel, and ladyfish. Best method was drifting the flats with potholes to locate the fish! Stone crabbing has been okay with us getting 2-3 pounds of claws with our ten traps. Make that nine traps as one was either stolen or run over not to be found.

The big news is the red tide that is entering our area! This past Sunday while pulling our stone crabs traps in St Joseph Sound, the three of us in the boat were coughing due to red tide. Also many dead mullet, catfish, spadefish, and pinfish were seen floating in the water. These were brought in from the gulf with the tide. Red tide needs fertilizer to make it bloom in such a mass and kill fish. This started down south and most likely the runoff from the last hurricane fed it. Also the west winds are blowing it toward our beaches and inlets. Let's pray for a strong east wind to blow this red tide far out in to the gulf. Remember two years ago the red tide killed many fish including gamefish we love to catch. It also chased the scallops further north causing few scallops to be caught during the Pasco County 10 day season. Hopefully, our Governor will make it a priority to combat the red tides, we cannot afford another Piney Point type incident again.

Remember, we have a fishing forum on our website. Start talking and sharing ideas, questions, tips with our club members. Call me and give me ideas on what you would like to see from DBC Fishing Committee. Better yet, join the fishing committee and help run an event.


Chassahowitzka River March 30,2023 10:00 AM

Park at the Chassahowitzka River Campground. The parking fee is \$5. The launch spot is right there.




Book Club...

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
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
