Our Speakers for January 15th meeting are **Tracy Love Tippin** and **Jenna Byrne** to talk about the **Annual Hope Spot Festival.**

Tracy is a long-time Dunedin resident, soon-to-be lifetime member of the Dunedin Boat Club, and Windlass since 2008, who raised her two boys right across the street from the marina before moving to Costa Rica and becoming super passionate about the environment. Upon her return, she led classes on sustainability and eco-tours to Costa Rica, and is current director and event planner for Blue-Green Connections, a Dunedin nonprofit focused on sustainable use of land and waters.

Jenna formed the Water Warrior Alliance to encourage the community to join forces in the fight against pollution in February 2017. She unites like-minded groups, businesses, and organizations for the ultimate goal of fighting plastic pollution. Through her plastic-free pledge, many area businesses have swapped price and convenience for a more conscientious and conservation-minded approach and have moved away from single-use plastic.

The **Annual Hope Spot Festival** will be hosted by Blue-Green Connections in partnership with the City of Dunedin on Saturday, February 17th at Edgewater Park to celebrate our waters! It is an ocean-themed, family-friendly event with DJ, live music, food, drinks, Eat Drink Local "Taste of Dunedin", Dunedin Ocean Sweep, community art and activities, live native animals, student entrepreneurs, speakers, and hands-on educational experiences. It features over 60 eco-conscious vendors and ocean-focused exhibitors, including Clearwater Marine Aquarium, Florida Aquarium, Mote Marine Laboratory and Aquarium, Tarpon Springs Aquarium, Tampa Bay Watch, Tampa Bay Raptor Rescue, US Coast Guard, Water Warrior Alliance, Zoo Tampa and more. It will be similar to the 2023 Hope Spot Festival, which we believe was the FIRST third-party certified Zero Waste Festival on the Gulf Coast of Florida!

The Dunedin Ocean Sweep Trash Collection Tournament is hosted by Water Warrior Alliance in partnership with Blue Green Connections Hope Spot Festival and generously sponsored by the City of Dunedin. Water Warrior Alliance is eager for the upcoming Dunedin Ocean Sweep Trash Collection Tournament. Their ongoing commitment to this cause continues, and every tournament remains a fundraiser for scholarships for Camp Coral.

This year's event is set to be a dynamic event focused on environmental stewardship and community engagement. Participants, ranging from Dunedin Boat Club members to existing environmental organizations, universities and school clubs, join forces to collect ocean debris across three divisions: Waterborne, shoreside, and a dedicated youth division. Teams will compete in categories such as total weight, most unique item, and a specialty category and many prizes will be awarded!

Fishing Report...

Mullet are running now and can be caught with a snatch hook or cast nest around the docks and flats. These are great smoked and can be used for a good fish spread! You can also eat the roe, fry or sauté it with your favorite spices.

Fish between the cold fronts and use paddle tails to find nice sized speckled trout and silver trout. Both are tasty however only keep enough silver trout for dinner as they will not keep much more than a month in the freezer. You may also find some redfish while fishing for trout, they also like to hang out in the schools of mullet on the flats.

Fish docks now for sheepshead and black drum using shrimp or fiddler crabs for bait. The smaller drum up to 24 inches are great to eat and will not have worms like the giant adults.

Watch the weather and fish between the fronts!


Book Club...

Insights...



January Highlight Peter & Mary Kolb Life Members Joined 2003

Mary began life in a small town in Minnesota, the youngest of 8. She was the only one not born at home on the farm. She grew up in Marshaltown, Iowa. Peter was born in rural southern Illinois, near St. Louis. They met in Seward, NE for high school and college, and were married in 1972. After Peter graduated from Concordia Teachers College, we escaped the cold to his first teaching position in Houston, TX. Son Paul was born there in 1976 and then Stacy was born in Orlando in 1978, after accepting a teaching position there.



Somewhere in these years, Mary's family held a reunion in Estes, CO. Mary's brother-in-law had some experience and rented a sailboat on Lake Dillon for an afternoon. This is where the seed was planted, with the peace and serenity of sailing.

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
In 1981, we left Orlando, packed up a U-Haul and headed to Concordia Seminary in St Louis. Mary again found travel agency work as Peter attended classes, did afterschool childcare, and evening night watchmen work. The graduation assignment was to Seymour, TN, located between Knoxville and Sevierville. Our Appalachian experience was unique to say the least. We were barely accepted as Yankees in the Smokies in 1984.

In 1990 we were given the opportunity to head back to Florida, Peter served the Lutheran congregation in St. Cloud and Mary made plans to open her first travel agency. We built a home on the Orange-Osceola County line. We were equal distant from the St Cloud congregation, the South Orange Blossom Trail travel agency, and the Orlando Luther High School. These were the high mileage days,

but worth every mile. As Peter served the local congregation, we learned Disney was planning a 'front porch' community known as Celebration. This presented us with the opportunity to open a second travel agency and spend even more time on the road. What really got the travel agencies off to a running start was the first gulf war. Nobody wanted to fly internationally, and the agency was named All Cruises – anyone can guess the specialty. With continuing international unrest, we sold the travel agencies to Go Travel and Mary began working for them from home.

Insights...





We sold the home in Osceola County where the kids completed school and moved to Dunedin in 2002. This was our chance to begin making our sailing dream a reality, we had finally arrived at the salt water. We put a deposit on a slip in the marina before we even went house hunting. A year later we came home with our training boat, a 30' Catalina, joined the Boat Club, and went beer can racing to learn to sail. After a lot of hands-on learning, with all the mistakes to go with it, our GulfStar moved in across the dock from us. A couple more years and it became our home. During all those years I read every issue of Lats & Ats cover to cover. I didn't have time to make all the mistakes myself, I had to learn some lessons the easy way.

We moved aboard in the marina, sold the condo and eased away from the dock. We lived on the boat serving as Caladesi Marina Hosts for 4 months. Not everyone is comfortable doing what we did, we kind of winged it, worked at it, and it worked. We started at 64 years old and took a whole year to make it happen, so we could ease into it. By then we thought we were ready. We left Dunedin Marina on Friday February 13, 2017, Michele Clark threw us our lines for the last time! Mary had tears, but we were finally off! We spent two cruising seasons traveling the coast of Florida from Dunedin to Ft Lauderdale and back. Then continued to Bimini and on down the eastern chain of islands.

We only cruised outside of hurricane season. During storm season we were always holed up somewhere. Every other year the boat was out of the water somewhere for bottom painting for the next cruising season. Again, we were fortunate, we had family and friends who put us up, or put up with us, some for months at a time. We truly lived like gypsies in those days, and it was fun!





Insights...



We spent Covid quarantined in St. Kitts, but eventually made it to Grenada. After two seasons in Grenada, health issues told us we needed to be back in the states.

In July of 2022 we put Last Call with a broker in Grenada and flew home permanently to Dunedin. A year later we sold the boat. We reside most of the year in our daughter's condo in St. Andrews Links and January to April are in a travel trailer. Peter enjoys time on the water now as a Captain of the Caladesi Ferry and Mary keeps trying to retire as a Travel Agent.








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
